



Did you know that over half of Burnet County residents rely on groundwater for their homes?

Understanding our local water sources helps us appreciate and protect them better. Do you know and take pride in your local water source?



Interactive Well Map



Experience the journey of water as it courses through the state in a well made video of the lifeblood of Texas by the Environmental Defense Fund.




In The News

Groundwater Tip of the Month



Using drip irrigation not only conserves water, but can actually help your plants thrive! It's considered far more efficient than watering with a sprinkler, allowing 30%-40% more water that is applied to be available to the plants. The water is applied directly to the soil with a series of tubes and emitters, preventing evaporation that commonly happens with sprinkler systems.
